One of my favorite passages praising the works of the virtuous woman is Proverbs 31:28-31 which reads:

Her children rise up and bless her; her husband also, and he praises her, saying: "Many daughters have done nobly, but you excel them all."

When I present my More Hours in My Day seminars around the country, I have the great opportunity to chat with women one-on-one. Being a mom and a maker of the home is the greatest calling a woman can have. As the home goes, so goes the world. You play an extremely valuable part in determining the future of our country. There can't be enough praise given to you as a mom. I stand amazed at how much women love their families. Hold your head up high, and know that you are obeying a sacred calling as a mom.

Ooes your body language say "Welcome" to those you come in contact with, or does it say something less warm and friendly, such as "Stay away!"? What people sense in your outward demeanor might be a true reflection of your inner feelings. This is certainly something to think about today! First impressions go a long way in letting people know who you really are.

Our kitchens can tell a lot about our homes as well. Are they spaces that say "Life is happening here!" or do they shout out something less inviting, such as "Disaster Zone! Caution!"? Here are some ideas for creating the kind of kitchen that leaves a lasting good impression on your family and your guests.

- Help a child plant some seeds in a small container and place it in your kitchen window. Watch them sprout.
- Instead of buying commercial applesauce, buy apples and make your own. A bowl of homemade applesauce with a sprinkle of cinnamon is an easy-to-make snack or dessert.

- Stir up a batch of blueberry or cranberry muffins, and bake for a sweet and colorful treat.
- Let your young children experience the satisfaction of boiling eggs, scrambling eggs, and making their own waffles and/or pancakes.
- Teach children how to be organized in the kitchen. "Clean as you go" is a great motto and method.

Make a habit of inviting God to be present at your meals. After the meal is prepared and the table set, pause, hold hands with your family and any guests, and ask the Lord's blessings as you also express thankfulness for the meal and for those gathered around the table. We must not take for granted each meal we eat or the people we love—these gifts all come from above.



Prayer: Father God, thank You for the gift of food. Oh, how we love to eat good food prepared by loving hands. We are grateful that You provide for all our needs. Amen.

Action: Clean out your kitchen cupboards, then reorganize them. Getting your kitchen in order will help make mealtime preparation more enjoyable.
