


What if an animal network filmed an episode in the Garden of Eden?

NARRATOR: This lion has three delightful little...?

ADAM: Cubs. Yeah, cubs. They look like cubs.

NARRATOR: They follow their father, imitating him and learning from him.





NARRATOR: Across the river is a...group?


ADAM: No, a herd...let's say herd.


What would this story sound like on a weather TV network?

the elderly and orphans? But what if your assignment was to build a *yacht*? Well, our own Brad Cumulous is out in the field with a man who got that very assignment. Brad?

BRAD: Thanks, Tonya. A lot of people would say that boating is one of their favorite pastimes, but the man you're about to meet takes it a step further. Six-hundred-year-old Noah woke up one morning and heard a lot more than an alarm clock...



NOAH: As soon as I woke up that day, God spoke to me and told me He wanted to get a new start on planet Earth, so He was going to flood the whole thing. Well, I tell you, that kind of scared me. "What's that?" I asked.


"I need you to take two of every kind of animal in the world on board with you."


BRAD: Dove, trees...interesting.

NOAH: I call it an ark.


BRAD: Okay. Well, Tonya, what do you think? Is there rain in Noah's forecast?
