LESSON 1

THE DAZE OF GLOBAL DECEPTION

The thicker fog gets, the more dangerous it becomes. The same is true about deception. The more that deception abounds, the greater the need for us to exercise discernment in our everyday living. Scripture tells us that as we approach earth's last days, deception will worsen. We are surrounded by hazards that are difficult to see. And the only way to safely navigate our way through the daze of deception is to walk in the light that God's Word provides. Though the Bible was written 2,000 years ago, it is filled with wisdom that addresses the crises we face today. The psalmist's declaration, "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" is still true as ever (Psalm 119:105).

The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines deception as "the act of causing someone to accept as true or valid what is false or invalid."* The reason deception is so tricky to avoid is that it masquerades as truth. Those who peddle lies present their narratives as truths with the intent to persuade and convince. And one of the most effective ways they do that is to shroud falsehood with some element of truth. It's that little bit of truth that is used to bait people into swallowing a lie.

The very definition of deception should tell us it is hard to recognize, which is why we need to exercise so much caution.

Jesus warned this would happen as our world draws closer to the last days. When the disciples asked the Lord about the signs of His future return, what were His very first words? "Take heed that no one deceives you" (Matthew 24:4).

We dare not take our Lord's exhortation lightly. That's because deception can cause us to stray from God's path—and His light. It can leave us stumbling in the darkness, vulnerable to errors that can cause great harm to us.
